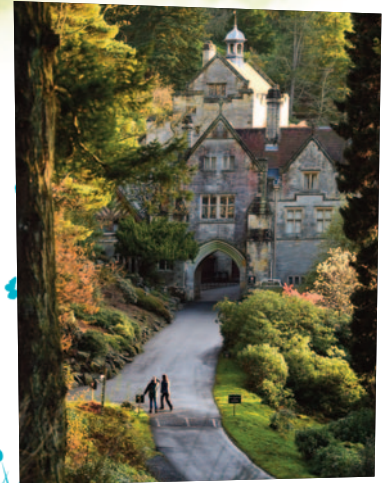

### Carriage Drive

Discover Cragside by car via the circular 6-mile Carriage Drive.

Starting at the archway of the House, the drive was originally created for Margaret Armstrong to view the estate while horse-riding and driving. This scenic route gives you access to the upper estate and Cragside's extensive network of walks.

## Walking Cragside

Cragside's scenery and landscape changes throughout the year. In the spring, buds begin to show, and early flowers begin to bloom. As summer approaches the rhododendrons present their annual show. Then autumn brings a warm glow to the estate as the leaves turn and begin to fall.

### Armstrong Trail

2 miles, 1 hour  
Terrain: Gravel paths, uneven steps, hills in places

Start: **Visitor Centre / Tumbleton Lake**  
Follow on map: ● ● ● ● ● ● ● ●  
Look out for green way markers

A tour of the lower estate that takes you past some of Cragside's historic features including the House and the Iron Bridge with a finale at the Powerhouse.



### Nelly's Moss

1½ miles, 1 hour,  
Terrain: Reasonably level, rock and gravel surfaces

Start: **Crozier car park**  
Follow on map: ● ● ● ● ● ● ● ●  
Look out for blue way markers

A family-friendly, flat walk around two historic, man-made lakes which formed part of Cragside's hydroelectricity system. Look out for frogs, toads and even herons dipping their feet in the water.



### Wetland Walk

1½ miles, 1 hour  
Terrain: Mud track, rocky areas

Start: **Cragend car park**  
Follow on map: ● ● ● ● ● ● ● ●  
Look out for the orange way markers

Walk to Cragside's driest lake. Blackburn was once the largest expanse of water on the estate until it burst its banks in 1927. This area is now a wetland making it a great place for wildlife spotting.



### Gun Walk

3 miles, 2 hours,  
Terrain: Rocky, stone steps, a short steep descent

Start: **House forecourt**  
Follow on map: ● ● ● ● ● ● ● ●  
Look out for red way markers

Follow the historic trail of the Gamekeepers. Walk between impressive rock formations, along craggy paths, and through tunnels of rhododendrons on this challenging walk through the heart of Cragside.

Some paths remain closed due to storm damage. You may be diverted while walking.
