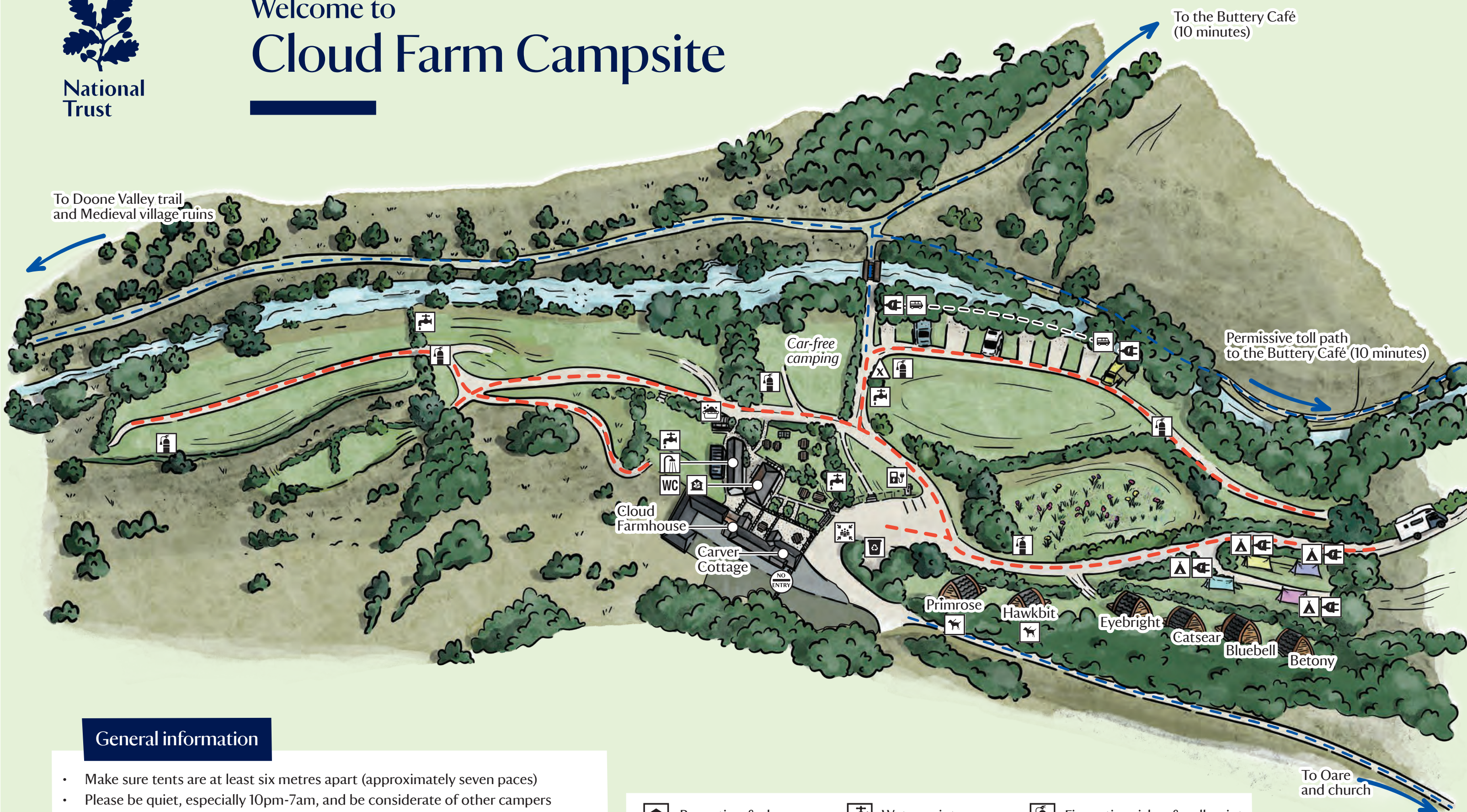

General information

- Make sure tents are at least six metres apart (approximately seven paces)
- Please be quiet, especially 10pm-7am, and be considerate of other campers
- Help us keep the site clean by using the recycling point and waste bins
- Fires are only allowed if they are contained and raised off the ground
- Well-behaved dogs on leads are welcome so long as they are cleaned up after
- All of our taps and water points are drinking water safe
- There is free wifi within range of the reception building (no password)

Some tips

 We're in a dark sky reserve, so you'll find there's minimal external lighting around site. Please take care when moving around site after dark. Torches and batteries are on sale at reception.

 The nearest pubs are the Staghunters in Brendon (3 miles) and The Blue Ball in Countisbury (5 miles). Lynton (8 miles) and Porlock (8.5 miles) both have ATMs, local grocery shops, pharmacies, post offices, pubs, cafes and restaurants.

 As you walk the surrounding country lanes look out for local chutneys, jams, homemade cakes, eggs and other tempting items sold outside private homes.

Arlington Court and the National Carriage Museum

30 minutes' drive towards Barnstaple

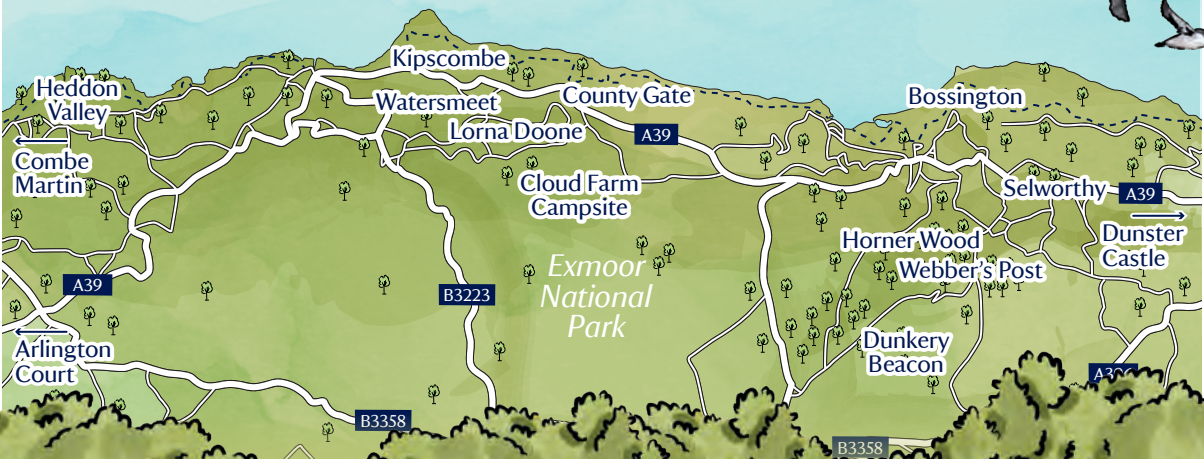
Arlington Court is an unexpected jewel on the edge of Exmoor, a complete family estate held by the Chichester family for over five hundred years. The collection consists of treasures for all tastes, from model ships to shells, collected over several generations. The house itself, built in 1823 and extended in 1860, has an austere façade. However, inside the cosy rooms purvey a homely, family atmosphere.

Dunster Castle

30 minutes' drive towards Minehead

Dramatically sited on a wooded hill, a castle has existed here since at least Norman times, with an impressive medieval gatehouse and ruined tower giving a reminder of its turbulent history. The castle that you see today became a lavish country home during the 19th century for the Luttrell family, who lived here for 600 years.

The terraced garden displays varieties of Mediterranean and subtropical plants, while the tranquil riverside wooded garden below, with its natural play area, leads to the historic working watermill. There are panoramic views over the Bristol Channel and surrounding countryside from the castle and grounds.



The National Trust in North Devon

The National Trust looks after 9000 acres of land and are undertaking some exciting conservation projects at the moment.



Wildflower Grassland Project

Did you know that 97% of native grassland across the UK has been lost in the last 100 years? The National Trust's largest ever wildflower grassland project is happening in North Devon. We are creating pockets of species-rich grassland to improve the wildflower diversity of 1275 hectares. That's equivalent to 1786 football pitches.

Growing the wildflower meadows will help the local wildlife, as well as attracting new species to the area such as the Small Blue butterfly.

We have named our Pods after some of the wildflowers species we are planting.

Kipscombe Nature Recovery Project

Set above Lynmouth on the North Devon Coast, the farm is a combination of traditional farmland, heathland and woodlands. Exmoor Ponies graze the heathland and Longhorn Cattle graze in low numbers across the farmland.

We are looking at every aspect of the farm to see if a different approach to farming can help improve the landscape for wildlife and help in the fight against climate change. We are working to increase the area of heathland, enrich the farmland meadows with wildflowers and connect isolated blocks of woodland through tree and scrub planting.
