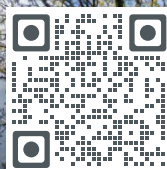

Our year in numbers

The National Trust is pleased to report ongoing stability in income and support from members, donors and volunteers.

The Trust’s financial approach during 2025–26 was shaped by a continued commitment to balancing long-term conservation objectives with the need for financial sustainability. Investment in property conservation and acquisitions remained substantial at £211.3m (2024–25: £221.2m). Prior year expenditure had been boosted by a drawdown of the reserves built up in earlier years. The Trust is now returning its programme of projects to levels that more closely balance in-year income and expenditure.

The continued delivery of the Trust’s ambitious ten-year strategy requires both reliable income generation and action to address the pressures of rising costs. Against this backdrop, the focus has been on reshaping costs to ensure that resources remained aligned with the Trust’s charitable purpose. During the year, the Sustainable Future Programme was delivered. This was a significant organisational restructure designed to support the ten-year strategy and reduce ongoing operating costs. The programme was a critical step in safeguarding the Trust’s long-term financial health. The cost of the

programme was £16.4m and partially covered by in-year spending controls. The savings generated by the programme will help direct more funds to core work.

Alongside managing costs, income growth is crucial to the delivery of the Trust’s cause. Membership income continues to provide a financial foundation for the Trust – membership numbers remained stable in 2025–26 and income grew to £324.2m (2024–25: £309.4m). The breadth and loyalty of the membership base help deliver a stable source of unrestricted income, enabling the Trust to take a long-term view of conservation.

Thanks to strong ongoing support from donors, the income from fundraising, appeals, gifts, legacies and grants amounted to £124.7m in the year (up from £123.1m in the prior year). This income played an important role in delivering conservation at scale, enabling the Trust to progress significant conservation programmes, invest in specialist skills and respond to urgent risks arising from climate change and nature loss.

Commercial income (rising from £221.9m to £236.5m) remained a vital contributor to the Trust’s overall financial resilience. Revenue generated through the Trust’s trading subsidiaries, food and beverage, holidays and other trading activities conducted through the charity, is reinvested into properties’ conservation and presentation. This helps the Trust enhance the visitor experience while supporting the upkeep of the estate, helping to fund conservation activity that might otherwise be unaffordable.

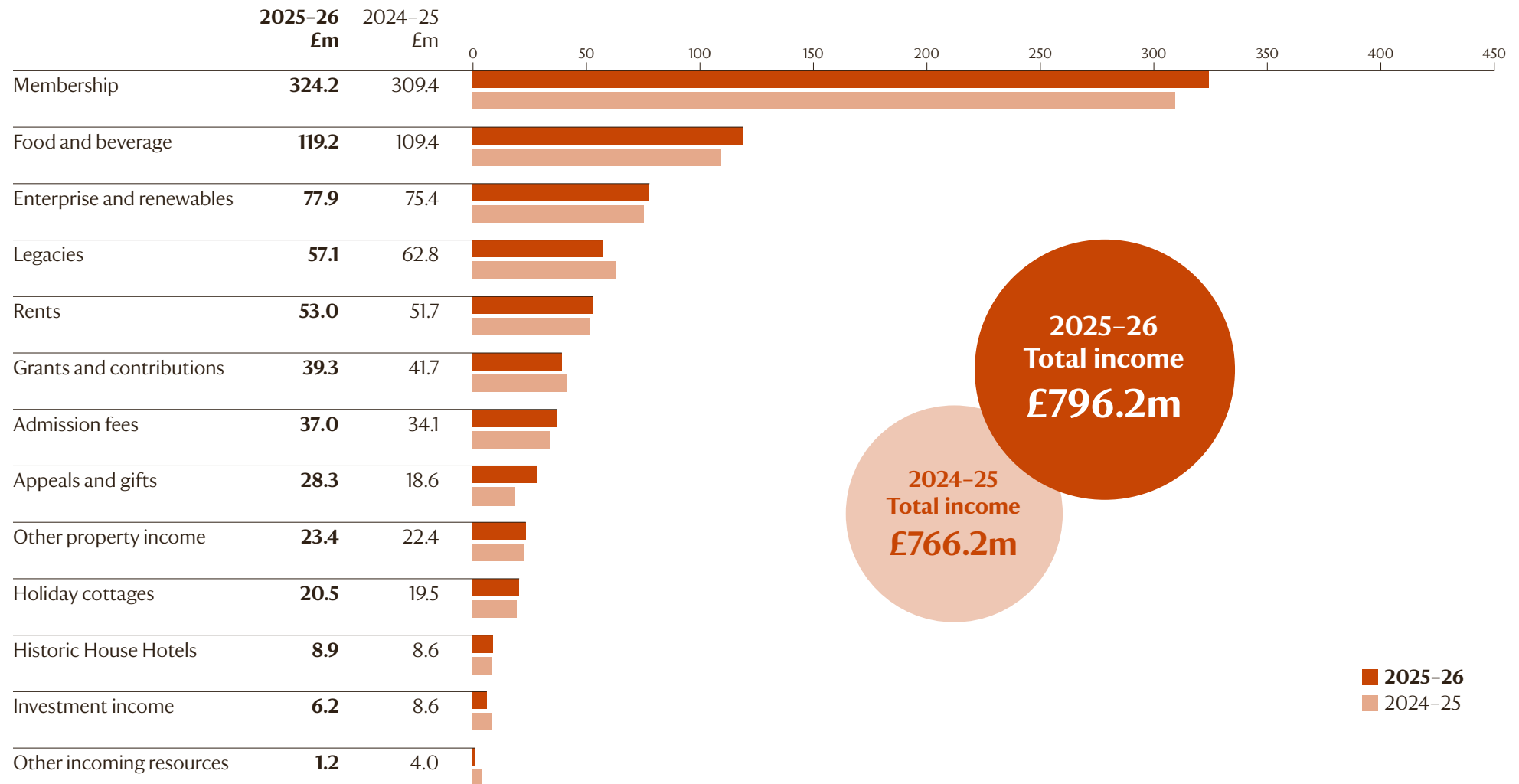
Appointment of the external auditor

The Trust’s Audit & Risk Committee is responsible for overseeing the effectiveness of the external auditor and, in line with regular practice, has re-tendered the Trust’s external audit contract. A shortlist of audit firms were invited to set out their proposals. These proposals were reviewed by the Committee and a recommendation made that the Board appoint PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP as the Trust’s external auditor for the 2026–27 financial year. This recommendation was accepted by the Board and is put to the AGM for member agreement. The performance of the external auditor will be monitored by the Audit & Risk Committee on behalf of the Board.

The external auditor’s report for 2025–26, which was produced by KPMG, is included within the **Annual Report and Financial Statements**.

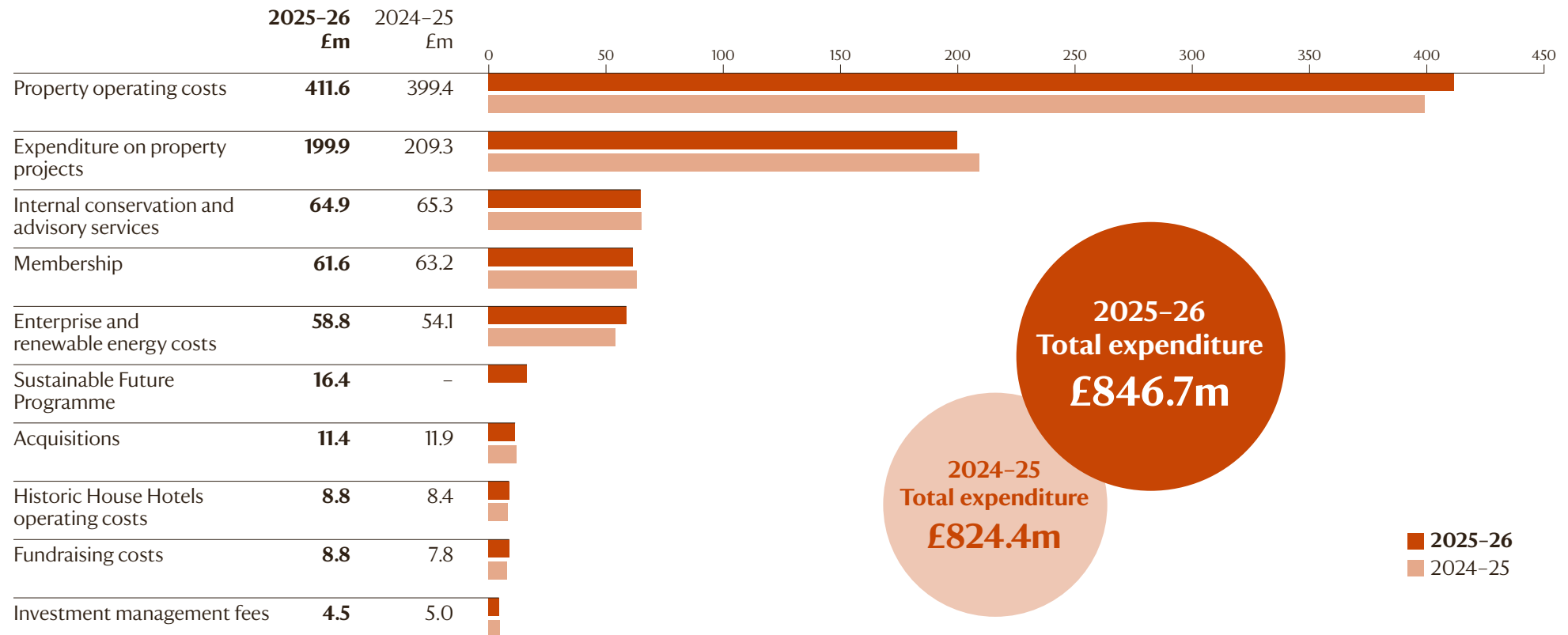

Members' resolutions

Members' resolution about the nomination and seconding of Council election candidates by other members

Any member who wishes to stand for election to the Council of the National Trust should be nominated and seconded by other members.

Supporting statement

The Council of the National Trust should have a strong mandate from the members. However, governance is currently suffering from member disengagement. Between 2023 and 2025, voter turnout fell by about 60%, partly due to an overly-long ballot that makes meaningful scrutiny of candidates nearly impossible. Currently, any individual can appear on the ballot via an online form with no prior commitment to the Trust.

In contrast, members wishing to bring a resolution must show the support of 50 members of 17 months' standing. This disparity is illogical.

Requiring a proposer and seconder is a standard democratic safeguard. It ensures candidates have a baseline of support and have engaged with the wider membership before seeking a seat on the Council. This minor change will improve candidate quality, shorten the ballot to a manageable length, and help build confidence in the Trust's democratic process.

Board of Trustees' response

The Board recognises the intention behind this proposal – to strengthen member engagement and confidence in the Trust's governance.

However, with the support of Council, the Board does not believe that requiring Council election candidates to be nominated and seconded by other members is the right way to achieve that aim.

Context

The National Trust exists for everyone, for ever, and we believe the same principle should apply to opportunities to contribute to its governance. All Council election candidates must already be members of the Trust. Council members derive their mandate from being elected by the membership, not from being nominated by two individual members. Requiring candidates to secure a nominator and seconder would introduce an additional barrier to standing for election. It could discourage capable candidates who are newer to the Trust, geographically isolated or without established networks. We want Council elections to attract the widest possible range of candidates, reflecting the diversity of the people and places the Trust serves.

The Board also does not believe that a nomination requirement would improve member engagement or voter turnout. It believes, based on recent evidence, that this can be better addressed by improving the information given to potential candidates about the role of the Council and its responsibilities.

The information provided to Trust members this year includes clearer explanations of the Council's and Nominations Committee's roles in the election process. With fewer candidates standing this year, members have a more concise set of election statements to review when making their voting decisions. Recent changes to the application process have already resulted in a more focused field of candidates without introducing additional barriers to the election process. For these reasons, the Board believes the proposal would reduce accessibility without delivering the intended benefits.

The comparison with the requirement for 50 members to support a members' resolution is not directly equivalent. A resolution seeks to change the Trust's policies or direction and therefore requires evidence of wider support before being put to the membership. Council elections have a different purpose: enabling members to choose from the broadest possible field of candidates.

We recommend that members vote against the resolution.

Members' resolution about the Trust's banking partner

This meeting demands that the Trustees instruct our finance officers to begin a competitive tendering process for banking arrangements as soon as practicable. The criteria used must seek a bank which has a moral and ethical outlook in keeping with National Trust core values, and whose corporate lending and underwriting practices demonstrate a positive commitment to safeguarding biodiversity and reducing human-induced climate change.

Supporting statement

Climate contradiction: The Trust calls climate change the greatest challenge facing our heritage and the natural world. Since the main cause is the burning of coal, oil and methane gas, it makes no sense for the Trust to partner with Barclays – which is Europe's largest bankroller of fossil fuel industries in the energy and power sectors.

Damaging nature: While the Trust works to restore nature, Barclays has spent billions (especially between 2024 and 2026) supporting tracking and methane gas pipelines in North America. These activities fuel the very ecological crisis that destroys the habitats we are trying to save.

A lack of review: Good management means large charities should check their banking options every three to five years to ensure they are getting the best deal and staying up to date. The Trust hasn't done this for a long time, which is a missed opportunity.

Legal duty under the 1907 National Trust Act: Trustees have a legal duty to protect our land and wildlife forever. By staying with a bank that funds environmental degradation, they side with those who put our gardens, houses, and landscapes at risk.

Double standards: The Trust already ensures its suppliers and investments are 'green'. It is inconsistent to hold our bank to a lower standard than our builders or our stock market portfolio. In 2022 and 2023 the Trust published advice which encouraged readers to bank ethically, and yet now in 2026 it still has not embraced this for itself.

Failed conversation: Despite mounting concern at AGMs since 2022, our executive team argue that "influence takes time", but years of discreet engagement with Barclays board have failed to curb its appetite for high-carbon industries. This carries reputational risk for the Trust, especially as climate-related events increasingly damage public health, agriculture and Trust properties such as Avebury Manor, Charlecote Park, Quarry Bank and Bodnant Gardens.

Greenwashing concerns: We shouldn't take Barclays' 'Net Zero' claims at face value. Their in-house 'bluetrack' evaluation ignores the support it is giving to a massive rollout of methane gas infrastructure in the USA. To be a leader in conservation, the Trust's money needs to be as green as its fields.

The bottom line: We need a bank that helps us protect nature, not one that profits from its destruction.

Board of Trustees' response

The Board of Trustees supports this resolution and believes it represents a proportionate response to an issue that has been of legitimate interest to a number of National Trust members. The proposal to undertake a competitive tender process in a practicable timeframe is, in principle, consistent with good governance and procurement practice.

Context

The Trust seeks to adhere to best practice procurement principles when making decisions about the suppliers it selects to support its operations and deliver its cause. Whilst the Trust's core cash management services have not been formally competitively tendered, it is important to recognise that this does not mean that the wider banking relationship has not. Over the last 10–12 years, the Trust has competitively tendered or market-tested a number of significant banking and financing arrangements, including its Revolving Credit Facility, card payment services, private placement agent bank arrangements and payment gateway services.

Support for this resolution should also be accompanied by recognition of several important caveats.

First, any tender process must be conducted in accordance with procurement best practice that enables the Trustees to exercise full and proper stewardship

over charitable resources. The objective of any tender should be to secure the best overall outcome for the charity across a balanced set of criteria. The process should therefore be fair and evidence-based, with clearly defined evaluation criteria, appropriate weighting of environmental, social and governance factors, proper assessment of operational, technological and financial risks and benefits and a demonstrable focus on value for money. Trustees must ultimately balance ethical considerations with their responsibility to safeguard the charity's assets, its resilience and long-term effectiveness.

Secondly, the scale and complexity of the Trust's banking requirements must be acknowledged. The Trust handles hundreds of millions of pounds of receipts and payments, manages extensive physical cash collections across more than 200 locations, operates sophisticated treasury and cash pooling arrangements and requires substantial credit facilities. Any banking transition would therefore be a major operational programme that must be carefully managed.

Thirdly, the tender must remain open to the major UK clearing banks. While some members may understandably aspire to the use of a specialist ethical bank, the evidence presented to the Board of Trustees indicates that no such provider currently has the combination of cash handling capability, lending capacity, payments infrastructure and operational scale required to support an organisation of the Trust's size and complexity. The key question is therefore not whether a bank has no connection whatsoever to fossil fuel financing, but which institution can demonstrate an overall alignment with the Trust's strategy and a proven ability to provide a high quality, secure and value for money service.

By calling for a tender "as soon as practicable", this enables the Trust to time such a process in a way that suits its needs to deliver the best outcome for the charity's cause.

We recommend that members vote for the resolution.

Council election

A ballot is held each year for the election of Council members.

All Council members are volunteers and serve a term of three years, with approximately one third of the elected positions being filled each year. This year we expect five vacancies, with successful candidates joining the Council from the date of the AGM.

About the Council

The Council appoints the Board of Trustees (the Trust's governing body) and holds them to account for the fulfilment of the charity's statutory purpose. The Council also reviews the Trust's strategy against this purpose and ensures the Board is managing the long-term interests of the Trust.

The Council is composed of 36 members; 18 are elected directly by you and 18 are appointed by organisations ('Appointing Bodies') which you elect every six years. The Chair is also a member of the Council.

About the Nominations Committee

The National Trust's constitution requires the Council to hold an election each year, to identify members who would meet its needs over the next three years. The election process is managed on behalf of the Council by a Nominations Committee appointed for this purpose.

This year's members of the Committee were: Jane Dean (Chair), Ros Farrell, Joshua Rice, and Nigel Hallam (independent external member).

The Committee's task is to make arrangements for elections, assess applications from all candidates and to recommend those who most closely meet the published criteria for the role.

During the year, the Committee introduced a clearer explanation of the role of Council and its members to help manage application volumes, and implemented an online application form to streamline the recruitment process.

How the Nominations Committee reaches its recommendations

The Committee determines how candidates will be assessed. The criteria for the role of Council is described in the **Governance Handbook (Appendix d)** and includes:

- Understanding the core purpose of the Trust, its strategy and governance.
- Having knowledge/skills in areas of the Trust's work.
- Understanding of the Trust's stakeholders, such as volunteers, members, diverse communities and also an understanding of the Trust's wider beneficiaries.
- Being an ambassador for the Trust.

In addition, this year candidates were asked to submit a **CV and election statement** (see pages 19 to 30), and to respond to the following two questions:

- With reference to the Trust's core purpose and strategy, explain how, as a Council member, you would support the Council to fulfil its key governance responsibilities.
- Please describe the experience, knowledge and skills you would bring to understanding the needs of the Trust's stakeholders – including diverse communities, members, volunteers and partners – and how you would use these to represent the organisation positively to an external audience.

CVs and responses to these supplementary questions were collected to support the election process and provide additional context for the Committee. They are not published, as they are not part of the formal election materials.

The Committee reviews all applications. This year, 17 candidates (including those seeking re-election) were shortlisted and interviewed over three days.

The five recommended candidates are:

- Gemma Britton
- Monique Cleary
- Jim Dixon
- Sarah Hollingdale
- Simon Kearey

While the Nominations Committee has made its recommendations you can, of course, vote for whoever you choose.

The Committee was impressed by the level of support for, and interest in the Trust, and would like to thank all members who submitted an application.

Simon Abbott London and South East

I became a lifelong member of the National Trust in 2023, and I am motivated to play a more active role in protecting the landscapes, heritage, and biodiversity that define our national identity.

As a Chartered Geologist working in the engineering sector, I bring over 20 years of experience in stewarding large, complex, and environmentally sensitive assets. My professional career has centred on balancing operational needs with long-term sustainability, risk management, and responsible land use, principles that strongly align with the Trust's mission.

I am standing for Council because I believe the Trust must continue to evolve its approach to climate resilience, land management, and public engagement. My background in geoscience and infrastructure gives me a unique perspective on the challenges facing our natural and historic environments, from increasing weather impacts to pressures on finances and skills. I would contribute technical insight, strategic thinking, and a deep personal commitment to conservation.

As a lifelong member, I care deeply about the future of the Trust and ensuring it remains an organisation that people of all ages and backgrounds feel proud to support. I would be honoured to serve and help shape its direction for the years ahead.

Mash Bonigala London and South East

I have been a National Trust member for over 15 years. In that time the Trust has given me access to places and stories that have shaped how I think about England.

For the past two years I have been building The England Archive, a documentary photography project registered as a Community Interest Company (CIC), structured around one question: who is keeping England alive, and what happens when they stop? That work has taken me to endangered craftspeople on the Heritage Crafts Association's Red List, to churchwardens who are the sole reason a medieval building is still standing, and to elderly community members whose knowledge exists nowhere else.

That experience has taught me that heritage is not a building. It is the person inside it. When the human chain breaks, no amount of conservation work replaces it.

I am standing for Council because I believe the Trust needs people who are actively out in the field, building relationships with the makers, carriers, and keepers of English heritage, and who can bring that intelligence to governance.

My professional background is in brand strategy. I understand how organisations make the case for why they matter to people who haven't yet decided to care.

Gemma Britton Midlands and East

I'm standing for Council because I care deeply about the future of the National Trust, not only the places it protects, but the role it plays in people's lives and communities.

Georgia Cristea London and South East

In recent years the National Trust has given the impression of not loving its historic buildings. I would advocate for the Trust to show its commitment to protect, maintain and enrich the historic houses, collections, and gardens in its care, and to pass them on to future generations.

The handling of the fire at Clandon Park has damaged public confidence in this commitment. The scheme to keep the house as a ruin is contrary to the Trust's mission and sets a dangerous precedent. We need to go back to the drawing board and find a way to bring back what made the house special, while promoting heritage crafts.

In a fast-changing world, historic houses have stood the test of time. Although their uses have evolved, their 'spirit of place' remains intact, able to inspire and uplift visitors, provoking their own imagination rather than imposing contemporary narratives.

New technologies and critical interpretation have their uses, but these tools should be non-intrusive and fully reversible, enhancing visitors' experience without compromising heritage integrity. Interpretation should reveal, not overshadow, intrinsic meaning.

I would also advocate for greater member democracy, ending the Quick Vote and trusting and respecting each member's individual judgement.

Voting and registration

Voting and registering to attend the AGM

- You can only vote in the Council election in advance of the AGM.
- You can vote on resolutions in advance, or on the day if you register to attend.
- Voting is open to all eligible members and you do not have to attend the AGM in order to vote.
- If you wish to attend the AGM, you must register in advance.
- The deadline for advance voting by post or online, and registering to attend the AGM is 11.59pm on Friday 30 October 2026.
- Advance (proxy) votes will be cast at the AGM on 7 November or at an adjournment of the meeting thereof.

How to vote

It's easy to vote or register to attend online. If you've received an email from us about AGM voting, follow the personalised link in that email for a fast login experience.

How to register to attend

Alternatively visit the [Civica Election Services website](#) and enter with your membership number.

You are able to vote and/or register to attend by post if you have requested a paper copy of this booklet and a postal voting form in advance. The deadline to make this request is 5pm on 14 October. Make a request and find out more on [the Trust's website](#).

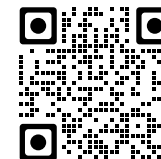
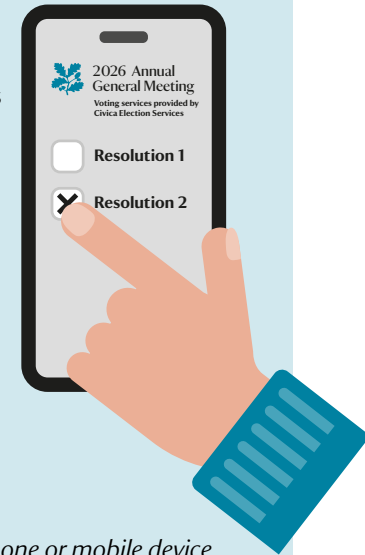

If you register to attend the AGM in person and would like to vote on the resolutions on the day, please bring a smartphone or mobile device* to access the CESjoinIN secure voting platform. Handheld voting devices are no longer in use.

Details of how to use the platform will be emailed to you by Civica Election Services before the AGM, including your security codes to join the event.

**If you do not have a smartphone or mobile device, please cast your vote in advance by 11.59pm on Friday 30 October 2026 – this is also the deadline to vote in the Council election. Alternatively, Civica, our elections provider, can assist you on the day.*

Attending the AGM

The AGM will take place in person at STEAM Museum in Swindon on Saturday 7 November 2026 at 10am. You can also participate online via CESjoinIN, including asking questions and voting on the resolutions.

Please tell us if you plan to join the meeting by providing an email address (or telephone number) when you register with **Civica Election Services**.

Spaces at the AGM venue may be limited and registering your interest does not guarantee an in-person place.

If you wish to attend in person, we recommend you register your interest as soon as possible. If interest to attend exceeds venue capacity, places will be allocated by ballot and some members may be asked to join online.

There is no limit on the number of people that can join online.

Civica Election Services is our independent vote services provider and will contact all attendees in late October to confirm their registration, provide details of how to use CESjoinIN, and issue personal security codes.

Vote on the resolutions

Please vote on the resolutions if you are not attending the AGM, or if you are attending and prefer to vote in advance. AGM attendees will have the option to cancel their advance vote and vote again on the day.

If you attend in person and wish to vote on the day, please bring your mobile device or smartphone to access the CESjoinIN secure voting platform. Hand-held voting devices are no longer in use.

If you wish to cast your vote on each resolution individually, please select (X) in the for/against/abstain box for each resolution. This is known as a specified proxy vote.

If you wish to give the chair of the meeting discretion on how to cast your vote, please select (X) in the discretionary box for each resolution this applies to. This is known as a discretionary proxy vote.

If you wish to support the Board of Trustees' position on all resolutions, please select the Quick Vote box, leave the rest of the section blank and proceed to the next section.

The **members' resolutions and responses** from the Board of Trustees' are set out on pages 11 to 15.

The terminology on the next page explains your voting options.

Vote for up to five Council election candidates

The **profiles of all the candidates** can be found in this document, on pages 19 to 30.

You can vote for up to **five** candidates by selecting (X) in the relevant boxes.

Alternatively, you can vote for the **five** candidates recommended by the Nominations Committee by selecting the Quick Vote option and proceeding to the next section.

Your voting options for the resolutions

If you are not attending the meeting, or wish to vote ahead of time on resolutions, you can cast a **proxy** vote. The chair of the meeting will be the nominated proxy and will vote as directed by you. This ensures all advance votes cast on the resolutions are registered and counted. There are two types of proxy voting:

- **Specified vote** This where you specify how you want your vote to be cast by your proxy (the chair) and they act as your representative and vote as directed by you.
- **Discretionary vote** This is where you give authority to your proxy (the chair) of the meeting to vote on your behalf in a way they see fit.

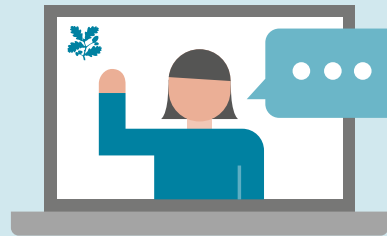
Voting on the resolutions and elections

We encourage you to read the information provided about the resolutions and Council candidates before casting your votes.

The **Quick Vote** option can be used if you wish to vote to support the Board of Trustees' recommendations on all resolutions, and/or vote for all the Council candidates recommended by the Nominations Committee. Quick Vote is a type of specified vote.

Get involved online

As well as asking questions via the CESjoinIN chat function, you can now request to come on screen live at the AGM to ask your question. Register to attend the AGM and information will be shared with you in advance, as well as explained by your host on the day.



Eligibility to vote and attend

- You are eligible to vote in the Council elections if you joined the National Trust on or before 20 August 2026.
- You are eligible to vote on the resolutions if you joined us on or before 28 August 2026.
- We check all voting returns against our membership records for eligibility. This helps us to ensure that all votes are valid as part of our voting security arrangements. If a member votes more than once in advance, only the first valid votes recorded will be counted.
- If you have recently become a member, you may be unable to log in via the website to vote and register to attend using your membership number. If this is the case, wait until at least 28 September 2026 before visiting the website. Please **email the Trust** if you require additional support.

Civica Election Services

Our voting arrangements are managed independently by Civica Election Services. Civica operates the voting website and the participation platform CESjoinIN. If you have any queries about either of these websites, please contact **Civica's customer services team**.

Fair processing notice

The National Trust will only process your information for the purpose of managing AGM voting and analysis of voting matters (not how individuals cast their votes). This data will be retained for 14 months before being deleted.
