Accessible path marked on map.




There are two steps into the manor house, but a ramp can be put down for entry. Only the first two rooms in the house are wheelchair accessible.


Both the gatehouse and first floor are only accessible by steep wooden steps.



Large print, braille guides and a virtual tour are available for use in the manor house. Please ask a member of staff for assistance.




























Assistance dogs are welcome in all areas.

Things to see and do...

The manor house

Discover 600 years of history in the medieval moated manor house and unique timber-framed gatehouse.

The orchards

Brockhampton is home to approximately 86 acres of traditional orchards which erupt into cloud-like blossom in spring and are laden with sweet fruit come autumn. Follow the accessible paths through the orchards to find out why they are a priority habitat and discover our new play trail marked 11 on the map.

The parkland

The timeless estate is made up of 1700 acres of mixed woodland and open parkland. The valley is home to streams, orchards and meadows, while the high ground offers breathtaking views over the surrounding countryside to the Clee Hills, Cotswolds and Malvern Hills.

Walks at Brockhampton

The orchard, parkland and woodland walks are best started from A on the map (Lower Brockhampton car park). The Herefordshire Views walk starts from B on the map. The walks pass through working farmland where cattle and sheep live, so please keep dogs on leads at all times and close gates behind you.

Orchard walk



Distance: 1.5 miles Time: 1 hour

Difficulty: Easy
Walk start point: A

Throughout the year this walk is a treat for the senses. The orchards, both young and old, are home to rare wildlife and beautiful in every season. Spring blossom displays give way to boughs laden with autumn fruit. Follow the winding accessible paths through the damson and apple trees, discover hundreds of newly planted trees and explore our new orchard play trail.

Woodland walk



Distance: 1.9 miles Time: 2 hours

Difficulty: Medium
Walk start point: A

Why not see how many native trees you can spot in the woodland? The woodland was once part of the Leggett inspired parkland. Some of the large old specimen trees will have been planted in the late 1700s as part of this design.

Parkland walk



Distance: 2 miles Time: 2 hours 30 minutes

Difficulty: Hard
Walk start point: A

A challenging walk around the Grade II listed parkland. Spot the veteran trees which are now home to many species of wildlife. Work has taken place around Lawn Pool to open up some of the original views to and from the Georgian house.

Herefordshire views walk



Distance: 1 mile Time: 40 minutes

Difficulty: Easy
Walk start point: B

Starting from the car park at the top of the estate, enjoy sweeping views across the county and beyond, to Bringsty Common, the Clee Hills, Cotswolds and Malvern Hills. This short walk takes you on a circular route around the top of the estate, taking in the church, Park Pond and glimpses of what used to be the walled garden for the Georgian house.

Your four-legged friend

Dogs are welcome on leads in the grounds and parkland. Please keep them on leads and under close control as we have cattle and sheep grazing

on the estate. Water bowls can be found in the courtyard at Lower Brockhampton, and dog waste bins can be found in the car parks.
