HANBURY HALL

400 acres of Grade II listed parkland

Since Hanbury Hall came to the Trust in 1953, the surrounding parkland has been gradually restored back to its impressive early eighteenth-century design; including work on the Semi-Circle, Long Walk and Lime Tree Walk.

Today you can enjoy walks that lead you through the remains of an ancient forest, past unusual design features and out into the beautiful Worcestershire countryside.



Blue Route

Easy going walk -1.5km, 15-20 minutes* (slight gradient)

This shorter, family friendly route will take you on a gentle stroll along oak lined avenues and out into open fields. These quiet spaces of the park are rich in wildlife; the perfect habitats for myriad species of birds, insects and other animals. Keep an eye out for the colourful Green Woodpecker who calls these trees home.

Grey Route

Steady stroll -1.8km, 20-25 minutes* (slight gradient)

This route will take you through the peaceful fields of the old deer park, with stunning views of the Worcestershire countryside. Along the way you'll pass many interesting and unusual eighteenth century design features including oak and lime avenues, the Semi-Circle and Brick Kiln Pond.



Orange Route

Leisurely ramble -3.5km, 30-40 minutes* (slight gradient)

This leisurely route will take you along avenues lined with majestic cedars and limes, past rare black poplars and into the remains of an ancient forest. Passing by a 'most beautiful oak' which, at close to 600 years old, is the oldest tree in the park. Along the way, discover how the restoration of this historic landscape continues with new plantations.
