You can buy our full-colour souvenir guide all around the property. Please ask in the house about Braille guides and foreign language guides.

Fun for children

We have family trails and 'tracker packs' available in reception. Trails are in the House and the Mill. Ask in Reception about join-in events in the school holidays.

Dogs welcome

There are around 8 miles of footpaths on the estate, so lots of space for walks. Assistance dogs are allowed in all areas.

For disabled visitors

We have Braille guides, and visually impaired visitors are encouraged to touch objects in the house – ask a room guide. Wheelchairs plus an accessible route map of the garden. Adapted toilets behind visitor reception. Please talk to one of us to help you get the most out of your day. We also have a shuttle bus to take you around the estate in the main season.

Enjoying local food and drink

The Barn Restaurant and Edgcumbe on the quay serve delicious local, fresh and seasonal food. Both offer children's menus, high chairs and bottle-warming. You're welcome to picnic wherever you like at Cotehele, excluding the courtyards, and you'll find designated picnic areas near the coach park and on the quay.

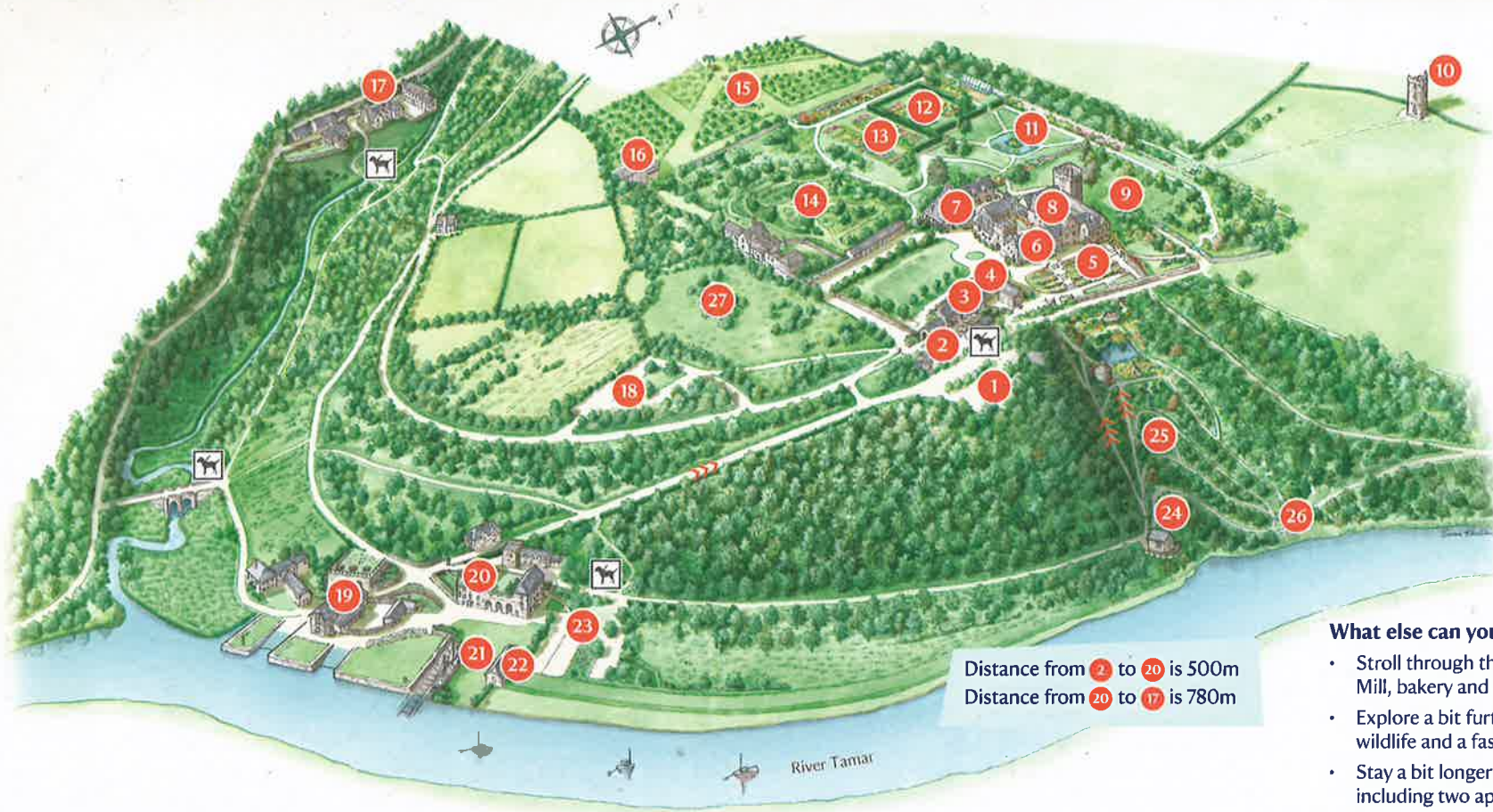

Time here stands still

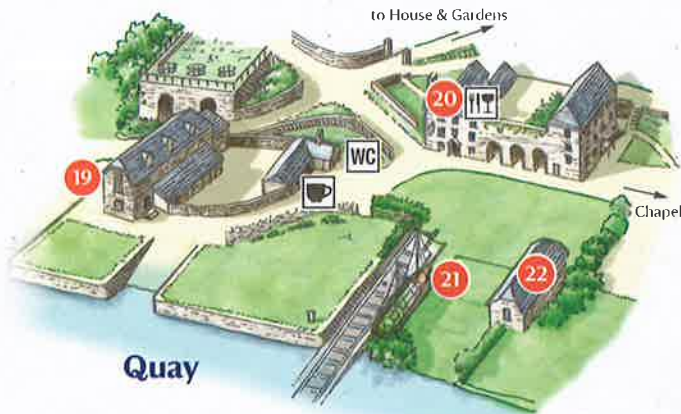
Welcome to Cotehele, ancestral home to the Edgcumbe family since 1353. For nearly six centuries it remained in their ownership until, in 1947, Kenelm, 6th Earl of Mount Edgcumbe, passed it to the National Trust.

Cotehele House, gardens, quay and mill are built on ancient foundations. In the woods are derelict buildings of past industries and a chapel that is the site of a local legend. The River Tamar winds through all these places and binds the tales of people who lived here.

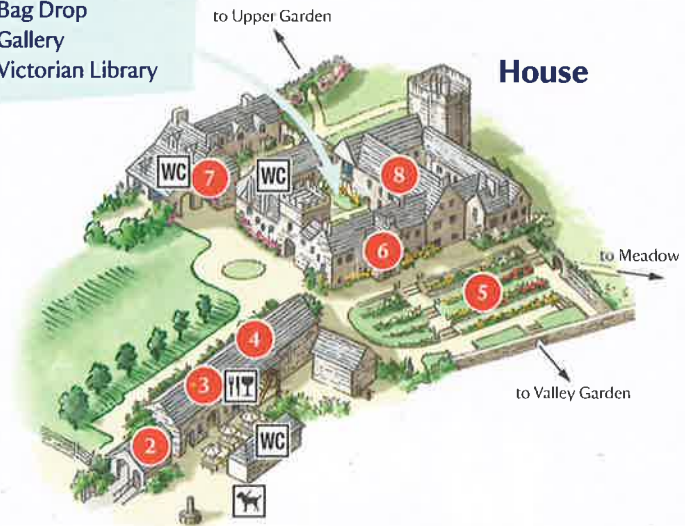
The story of Cotehele is more embroiled and older than we can ever know or tell. We invite you to explore, relax, and discover Cotehele's 'spirit of place' for yourself.

What else can you do here?

- Stroll through the woods (or jump on the shuttle bus) to Cotehele Mill, bakery and traditional workshops.
- Explore a bit further on a network of paths – discover a wealth of wildlife and a fascinating industrial past.
