

# Be a National Trust nature spotter

Which of these birds can you find hopping in gardens, perched in trees or flying through the sky?



**Collared doves** eat mostly seeds. You'll often see them in pairs and cooing loudly.



**Blackbird** females are brown - only male blackbirds are actually black!



**Great tit** is the largest tit in Britain and has a glossy black head.



**Chaffinch** males can have very bright feathers. It's one of the most colourful garden birds.



**Wren** is the most common bird in Britain. It's secretive and builds a hidden nest lined with moss and feathers.



**Blue tits** are often seen on bird feeders, or hunting for caterpillars in trees and bushes.



**Magpies** are colourful, clever and often noisy. Other birds don't like them as they can eat their eggs and chicks.



**Robin** is a garden bird, easy to spot with its bright red breast. Often hops around gardeners looking for worms.



**House sparrows** got their name because they often nest in and around houses. They like to have dust baths in the summer.
