

Devour this walk through chocolate as we totter into town savouring the Terry's family history.

Use the map inside this leaflet to guide you as we get a taste of Terry's history.

1. Goddards was the home of Noel Goddard Terry, Kathleen Leatham and their children. Noel's great grandfather, Joseph Terry founded the famous Terry's confectionary business, still known for the delicious Terry's Chocolate Orange and All Gold chocolates.

2. Turn left out of Goddards and turn left at Cherry Lane. Follow the lane straight down and walk onto the racecourse.

3. As you cross, head towards the left side of the racecourse stands.

4. Climb onto Campleshon Road and here you will see the famous clock tower and Terry's factory buildings, designed by JG Davis and LE Wade, completed 1926.

5. At the end of Campleshon Road, turn left and then onto Beresford Terrace on the right. Then onto Terry Street and right towards the bridge. On the left you will see Rowntree Park gates. Joseph Rowntree bought the land to stop the expansion of Terry's factory which was in Clementhorpe, just beyond this park.

6. Cross the bridge here. The river was used by boats bringing sugar and cocoa for the factory.

7. As you walk along the river, look left and you will see a path running down the other side of the river. This is Terry Avenue and leads down to the site of the old factory site which was steam powered.

8. Cross the blue bridge.

9. Go under the next bridge and then right through the park until you see Clifford's Tower.

10. York Castle Museum on the right now displays and stores a collection of Terry's chocolate packaging, moulds and books!

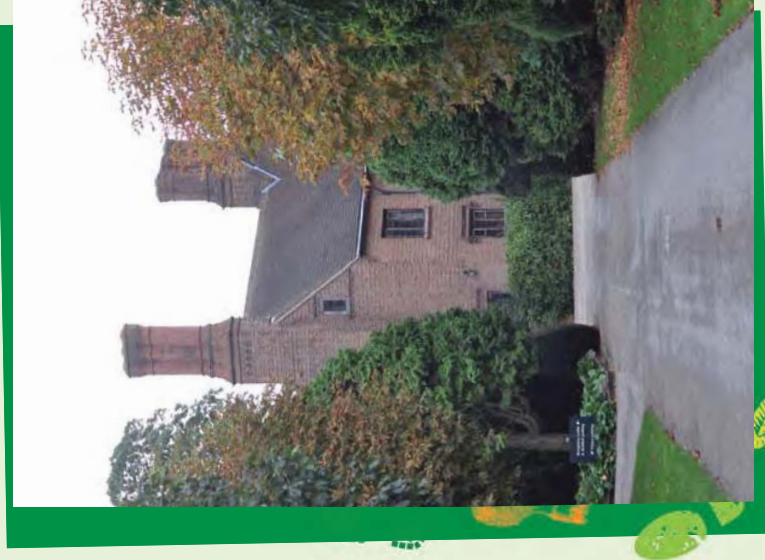
11. Noel Terry furnished his house Goddards, with 18th-century furniture. This collection can now be enjoyed here at Fairfax House.

12. At the end of Castlegate, turn right onto Coppergate and past Marks and Spencers and turn left up the Shambles.

13. Follow Goodramgate on the right, down to the National Trust shop. Why not stop in for a bar of chocolate and then have a rest with a cup of hot chocolate round the corner at Treasurers House Below Stairs Cafe - after all, this was the original form in which to consume chocolate!

If you wish to return to Goddards, follow the route marked, or pick up a number 4, 12 or 13 bus from the train station.
